Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Faith Assembly of God Church (the "Church"), which comprise the statement of financial position of the Church as at 31 December 2025, and the statement of financial activities, statement of changes in funds and statement of cash flows of the Church for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements are properly drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Singapore Societies Act, Chapter 311 (the "Act") and Financial Reporting Standards in Singapore (FRSs) so as to present fairly, in all material respects, the state of affairs of the Church as at 31 December 2025 and the results, changes in funds and cash flows of the Church for the year ended on that date.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Singapore Standards on Auditing (SSAs). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are independent of the Association in accordance with the Accounting and Corporate Regulatory Authority (ACRA) Code of Professional Conduct and Ethics for Public Accountants and Accounting Entities (ACRA Code) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Singapore, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the ACRA Code. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Other Information

Management is responsible for the other information. The other information comprises the Statement by the Deacon Board set out on pages 1.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with our audit of the financial statements, our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements, or our knowledge obtained in audit, or otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work we have performed, we conclude that there is material misstatement of this other information, we are required to report that fact. We have nothing to report in this regard.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the provisions of the Act and FRSs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Church's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Church or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Church's financial reporting process.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with SSAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.


As part of an audit in accordance with SSAs, we exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. We also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Church's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Church's ability to continue as a going concern. If we conclude that a material uncertainty exists, we are required to draw attention in our auditor's report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify our opinion. Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Church to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

We communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that we identify during our audit.

Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

In our opinion, the accounting and other records required by the Act to be kept by the Church have been properly kept in accordance with the provisions of the Act.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the financial year ended 31 December 2025

These notes form an integral part of and should be read in conjunction with the accompanying financial statements.

1. General Information

The Church is registered under the Societies Act, Chapter 311 in the Republic of Singapore. The Church's registered and operation address is located at 1A Kim Keat Road, Singapore 328803.

The principal activities of the Church are to propagate the gospel and teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Inspire Community Services, an affiliate of Faith Assembly of God Church obtained charity status on 26 October 2022 with UEN T22SS0042C and registered under Singapore Charities Act, Chapter 37.

The financial statements of the company for the year ended 31 December 2025 were authorised for issue by the Deacon Board on 9 April 2026.

2. Material Accounting Policies

2.1 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been drawn up in accordance with Financial Reporting Standards in Singapore ("FRSs") including related interpretations of FRS (INT FRS). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except as disclosed in the accounting policies below.

The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Church and are consistent with those used in the previous financial year.

The financial statements are measured and presented in the currency of the primary economic environment in which the entity operates. The financial statements are presented in Singapore Dollars, which is also the functional currency of the Church.

Interpretations and Amendments to Standards effective in 2025

In the current financial year, the Church adopted the new or amended FRS and interpretations to FRS ("INT FRS") that are mandatory for application from that date. Changes to the Church's accounting policies have been made as required, in accordance with the transitional provisions in the respective FRS and INT FRS.

The following amendments to FRS and Interpretation to FRS are effective for the annual periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025:

Management is assessing the impact on the financial statements.

2.2 Significant accounting judgments and estimates

The preparation of the Church's financial statements requires management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities at the reporting date. However, uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that could require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of the asset or liability affected in the future.

(i) Judgments made in applying accounting policies

In the process of applying the Church's accounting policies, management has made certain judgments, apart from those involving estimations, which has significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

Impairment of financial assets

The determination of whether a financial asset is impaired requires significant judgment. The Church evaluates, among other factors, the duration and extent to which the fair value of financial asset is less than its cost, and the financial health of and near-term business outlook for the financial assets, including factors such as industry performance, changes in technology and operational and financing cash flow.

(ii) Key sources of estimation uncertainty

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the end of the reporting period, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year are discussed below –

2.2 Significant accounting judgments and estimates

(ii) **Key sources of estimation uncertainty - continued**

Depreciation of property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their estimated useful lives. Management estimates the useful lives of these property, plant and equipment to be 4 to 100 years. The carrying amount of the Church's property, plant and equipment at 31 December 2025 was S\$1,394,169 (2024 – S\$1,460,013). Changes in the expected level of usage and technological developments could impact the economic useful lives and the residual values of these assets, therefore future depreciation charges could be revised.

Impairment of non-financial assets

The Church's assesses whether there are any indicators of impairment for all non-financial assets at each reporting date. Non-financial assets are tested for impairment when there are indicators that the carrying amounts may not be recoverable. When value in use calculations are undertaken, management must estimate the expected future cash flows from the asset and choose a suitable discount rate in order to calculate the present value of those cash flows.

2.3 Financial instruments

(i) **Financial assets**

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets are recognized when, and only when the entity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments. At initial recognition, the Church measures a financial asset at its fair value plus, in the case of a financial asset not at FVPL, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at FVPL are expensed in the statement of financial activities.

Other receivables are measured at the amount of consideration to which the Church expects to be entitled in exchange for transferring promised goods or services to a customer, excluding amounts collected on behalf of third party if the other receivables do not contain a significant financing component at initial recognition.

Subsequent measurement

Investments in debts instruments

Subsequent measurement of debt instruments depends on the Church's business model for managing the asset and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the asset. The three measurement categories for classification of debt instruments are amortized cost, fair value through other comprehensive income ("FVOCI") and FVPL. The Church only has debt instruments at amortized cost.

Financial assets that are held for the collection of contractual cash flows where those cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest are measured at amortized cost. Financial assets are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less impairment. Gains and losses are recognized in statement of financial activities when the assets are derecognized or impaired, and through the amortization process.

Derecognition

A financial asset is derecognized where the contractual right to receive cash flows from the asset has expired. On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and any cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income for debt instruments is recognized in statement of financial activities.

2.3 Financial instruments – continued

(ii) **Financial liabilities**

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial liabilities are recognized when, and only when, the Church becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. The Church determines the classification of its financial liabilities at initial recognition.

All financial liabilities are recognized initially at fair value plus in the case of financial liabilities not at FVPL, directly attributable transaction costs.

Subsequent measurement

After initial recognition, financial liabilities that are not carried at FVPL are subsequently measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method. Gains and losses are recognized in statement of financial activities when the liabilities are derecognized, and through the amortization process.

Derecognition

A financial liability is derecognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or expires. On derecognition, the difference between the carrying amounts and the consideration paid is recognized in statement of financial activities.

2.4 Impairment of non-financial assets

Assets are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of an asset may not be recoverable. Whenever the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount, an impairment loss is recognized in the statement of financial activities or treated as a revaluation decrease for assets carried at revalued amount to the extent that the impairment loss does not exceed the carried amount held in the revaluation surplus of the same asset.

Reversal of impairment losses recognized in prior years is recorded when there is an indication that the impairment losses recognized for the asset no longer exist or have decreased. The reversal is recorded in income or as a revaluation increase. However, the increased carrying amount of an asset due to a reversal of an impairment loss is recognized to the extent it does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined (net of depreciation) had no impairment loss been recognized for that asset in prior years.

The Church had no impairment loss recognition or adjustment for the period ending 31 December 2025.

2.5 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Church has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the Church will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. Where a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present obligation, its carrying amount is the present value of those cash flows.

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, the receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the financial year ended 31 December 2025

2.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include bank and cash balances and on demand deposits with financial institutions that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the statement of cash flows, the item includes cash and cash equivalents less cash subject to restriction that forms an integral part of cash management.

2.7 Leases

The Church leases equipment under operating leases from non-related parties.

The Church applies the short-term lease recognition exemption to its short-term leases of office equipment. It also applied the lease of low-value assets recognition exemption to leases of office equipment that are considered to be low value. Lease payment on short-term leases and leases of low value assets are recognized as expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.

Contingent rents are recognized as expenses in statement of financial activities.

2.8 Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost. The cost of property, plant and equipment is recognized as an asset if, and only if, it is probable that future economic benefits associated with will flow to the Church and the cost can be measured reliably. Subsequent to recognition, property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses.

Depreciation is computed on a straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset as follows:

Furniture, renovation and equipment	4 – 10 years
Motor vehicles	10 years
Buildings	100 years

For acquisition and disposal during the financial year, depreciation is provided from the month of acquisition and to the month before disposal respectively. Fully depreciated assets are retained in the financial statement until they are no longer in use. Any gain or loss on disposal of plant and equipment is taken to revenue.

The carrying values of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at each financial year end to ensure that the amount, method and period of depreciation are consistent with previous estimates and the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits embodied in the asset of the plant and equipment.

Property, plant and equipment are derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset is included in the statement of financial activities in the year the asset is derecognized.

2.9 Income taxes

The Church is exempt from income tax on income and gains falling within Section 13U(1) of the Income Tax Act to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

2.10 Fund structure

(i) **Unrestricted funds**

General fund

The general fund is available for use at the discretion of the Deacon Board in furtherance of the Church's objectives.

(ii) **Restricted funds**

The restricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Deacon Board within projects in furtherance of Church's objectives that have been identified by donors of the funds or communicated to donors when sourcing for the funds.

2.11 Revenue recognition

The Church recognizes revenue when the amount of revenue and related cost can be reliably measured; it is probable that future economic benefits will flow to the Church.

Offerings

Income from church offerings is recognized upon receipt.

Interest Income

Interest income is recognized on a time-proportion basis using the effective interest method.

2.12 Government grants

Government grants are recognized as receivable when there is reasonable assurance that the grant will be received and all attached conditions will be complied with.

When the grant relates to an expenses item, it is recognized as income on a systematic basis over the periods that the related costs, for which it is intended to compensate, are expensed. When the grant relates to an asset, the fair value is recognized as income in equal amounts over the expected useful life of the related asset.

When loans or similar assistance are provided by governments or related institutions with an interest rate below the current applicable market rate, the effect of this favorable interest is regarded as an additional government grant.

2.13 Employee benefits

(i) **Pension obligations**

The Church contributes to the Central Provident Fund ("CPF"), a defined contribution plan regulated and managed by the Government of Singapore, which applies to the majority of the employees. The Church's contributions to CPF are charged to the statement of financial activities in the period to which the contributions relate.

(ii) **Employees leave entitlements**

Employee entitlements to annual leave are recognized when they accrue to employees. Accrual is made for the unconsumed leave as a result of services rendered by employees up to the date of the statement of financial position.

9. Fair Value

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount at which the instrument could be exchanged or settled between knowledgeable and willing parties in an arm's length transaction, other than in a forced or liquidation sale.

Financial instruments whose carrying amounts approximates fair value

Management has determined that the carrying amounts of cash on hand and at bank, other receivables and other payables based on their notional amounts, reasonably approximate their fair values because these are mostly short term in nature.

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities are determined as follows:

- (1) The fair values of financial assets and liabilities with standard terms and conditions and traded on active liquid markets are determined with reference to quoted market prices.
- (2) The fair value of derivative instruments is determined using the market-to-market valuations available from financial institutions, estimated using generally accepted pricing models, taking into consideration duration of the instruments and quotes for similar instruments.

At the end of the reporting date, the Church does not have any financial instruments which will require disclosure of fair value measurements by level of fair value hierarchy.

10. Financial Instruments And Financial Risks

The Church's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks. The Church's approaches in managing those risks are discussed below: -

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of the Church's financial instruments will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates.

The Church's exposure to changes in interest rates relates mainly to its surplus funds placed with banks. Surplus funds are placed in fixed deposits with reputable banks which yield better returns than cash at bank. The deposits generally have short-term maturities so as to provide the Church with the flexibility to meet its working capital needs.

Based on sensitivity analysis performed at the end of the reporting period, management has assessed that the exposure to changes in interest rates is minimal and hence the resulting impact on the statement of the comprehensive income of the Church is insignificant.

Credit risk

Credit risk refers to the risk that counterparty will default on its contractual obligations resulting in financial loss to the Church. Receivable balances are monitored on an ongoing basis.

The carrying amount of cash and cash equivalents and other receivables represent the Church's maximum exposure to credit risk in relation to financial assets. No other financial assets carry a significant exposure to credit risk.

The Church places its cash with creditworthy institutions.

Foreign exchange risk

Foreign currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates.

The Church's exposure of foreign exchange risk arising from currency exposure is minimal.

Liquidity risk

The Church manages the liquidity risk by maintaining sufficient cash for its funding requirements.

11. Fund Management

The Church's objectives when managing its funds are:

- (a) To safeguard the Church's ability to continue as a going concern;
- (b) To support the Church's stability and growth; and
- (c) To provide funds for the purpose of strengthening the Church's risk management capability.

The Deacon Board considers the accumulated fund as the capital of the Church and no changes were made to the Church's fund management objectives.

10. RESOLUTION: REDEVELOPMENT OF 1A KIM KEAT ROAD

10.1 Presentation of the Resolution

The Chairperson presented the proposed resolution to redevelop the church property at 1A Kim Keat Road, Singapore 328803, comprising three key components:

1. To redevelop the property at an estimated cost of SGD \$14.8M to \$15M, inclusive of GST, over a period of 2 to 2.5 years.

To administrate interest-free loan agreements with church members and supporters, raising a collective amount of SGD \$2.5M to \$3M.
2. To sell 342A and 342B Balestier Road (referred to as the “Annexes”) to support project financing.

10.2 Voting Terms

Members were informed that the vote would be cast as one bundled resolution, meaning all three components would be approved or rejected together.

10.3 Financial Strategy Presentation

Deacon Deana D. Christian was invited to share the financial strategy behind the redevelopment project.

10.4 Vision and Purpose

The redevelopment is viewed as a generational project, building upon the work of previous generations. It aligns with the church’s mission to grow disciples and transform communities, ensuring the church’s infrastructure is prepared for current and future needs.

10.5 Rationale for Redevelopment

- a) Optimizing land usage for a multigenerational congregation, from children to seniors.
- b) Expanding community outreach, especially through Inspire Community Services (ICS), including the pilot “Happy Station” family engagement program launching in July.

- c) Facilitating kingdom partnerships, allowing portions of the building to be rented to other ministries.
- d) Increasing capacity, with plans to expand usable space by 2.3 times.

10.6 Proposed Building Features

The new facility will include:

- a) Five above-ground stories and one basement with parking.
- b) A variety of multipurpose halls (large, medium, and small), partitionable for flexibility.
- c) ICS facilities, meeting rooms, offices, and staff spaces.
- d) Parking: 17 lots in the basement and 6 on ground level.
- e) Two lifts and staircases.
The design prioritizes ministry use over excessive parking infrastructure.

10.7 Financial Overview and Strategy

Estimated Project Cost: SGD \$14.8M to \$15M

- a) An additional SGD \$2.5M–\$3M will be raised via interest-free loans.

- d) Details regarding terms, security, and confidentiality will follow if the resolution is passed.

10.8 Sale of Annexes

- a) The board is authorized to sell 342A and 342B Balestier Road to help fund the redevelopment.
- b) Legal and market processes may take a minimum of three months.
- c) The board will consider zoning issues and market conditions and retains discretion in the sale process.

- b) 85% Fundraising Milestone: September 2026
- c) Target Construction Start: January 2027
- d) Expected Completion: Q1 of 2029
- e) Loan Repayment Period: Mid-2029 to 2032

The Board responded that inserting fixed conditions could reduce flexibility and hinder responsiveness to market conditions. They assured members that prudent, responsible decisions would guide the process.

b) **Proposed Amendment C (Alternative Proposal to Amendment B)**

Ms. Low Lek Teng Anthea proposed a compromise: authorizing annex sale after July 2026 or upon raising SGD \$7.7M, whichever comes first, subject to board discretion.

Senior Pastor's Report

Here are three highlights of our journey in 2025:

1. Strengthening Our Inner Lives

Through the monthly Faith Leaders' Academy (FLA), we focused on the emotional and spiritual health of our leaders and servers. We believe that before we can serve God, we must first learn to receive from Him. The "Thrive in Wholeness" sessions by Rev. We continue to "enlarge our tents" through two major avenues:

- **Inspire Community Services:** We launched our first projects for seniors, including weekly exercise programs and "Happy Station" activities. These initiatives bring joy and wellness to our neighbours.
- **Missions in Cambodia:** We celebrated the first anniversary of Faith Assembly @ Veal. We also launched the Rainbow Centre to provide English classes for children. Despite some regional unrest in November, we remain committed to doing God's work while the door is open.

Looking Ahead: A New Vision

As 2025 came to a close, I spent time seeking God for our next steps. After a season of prayer, fasting, and discussion with our pastors and staff, we have refined our Vision, Mission, and Values:

NEXTGEN MINISTRY: FAITHKIDS & AMPLIFY

1. FAITHKIDS

1.1 Weekly Attendance

The weekly average attendance at FaithKids was 30. We were blessed to welcome 17 visitors during the year, and we rejoice that one of them has since become a regular attendee.

1.2 Leadership and Teaching Team

We extend our heartfelt appreciation to the leadership and teaching team for their faithful and committed service. We thank the Lord for a new addition to the leadership team. And for bringing two youths and one young adult to join the teaching team. These leaders strengthen the ministry.

1.3 Special Events

February: Council of Achievement (COA)

The annual COA celebrates the children's efforts and achievements in 2025 for completing various Bible and skills-based merits. The theme for COA was Fruit of the Spirit. We had a joyful time filled with laughter, fun, and a meaningful devotion on "The Fruit of the Spirit". We celebrated seven graduates and prayed for them as they transitioned into Amplify, our youth ministry.

August: Kids@Play Carnival

FaithKids participated in the carnival organised by the National Royal Rangers. We reached out to many children and their families through fun and engaging activities. A total of 28 Faithkids participated, including 10 new friends. The children enjoyed the game booths and had the opportunity to hear the gospel message in a meaningful and age-appropriate way. We praise God for seven children who responded to salvation!

September: Teacher's Day Celebration

We celebrated Teacher's Day with the theme "Battle of the Best" where the children challenged their commanders through a series of fun games. Our youngest age group, Ranger Tots (RT) also joined the celebration, making it a special and inclusive event for all. Commander Wai Leng shared a devotion and we enjoyed food and fellowship thereafter.

March and October: La Kopi Sessions & Children's Outing

The two La Kopi sessions were conducted for parents and grandparents. The topics covered were:

- 1) Helping children and grandchildren cultivate healthy digital habits.
- 2) Inter-generational parenting.

A total of 13 parents and grandparents participated. They appreciated the opportunity to learn from the invited speakers and one another when they shared their personal journeys of nurturing and mentoring children and grandchildren. These sessions were meaningful, fruitful, and impactful.

2.2 **Discipleship**

The weekly average attendance in Amplify was 25. 6 Amplifiers were water baptized and became church members.

2.3 **Outreaches**

We equipped Amplifiers on how to share God's love through care acts, and their testimony and sharing the Good News. Our Touch Grass outreach events reached 100 new friends and 27 came for our events in 2025. We gave out encouragement packs to our friends during the examination period. In our November Amplify Camp, four new friends joined us and they accepted Christ as their Lord and Savior! Amplifiers were also active in the Whampoa Community blocks blessing projects held in June and November.

2.4 **Building bridges with youths attending Sunday services**

Sherwin and the Amplify leaders connected with parents whose youths are attending Sunday services. Out of the 4 youths, 3 started joining Amplify regularly. We also connected with four Primary 6 students, and they are now a part of Amplify. Our heart is to disciple every youth in Faith to love and serve God.

2.5 **Amplify Camp (Nov): Camp Radiance**

37 campers were present. Many youths experienced the baptism of the Holy Spirit with the initial evidence of speaking in tongues. We are thankful to our guest speaker, Pastor Jay Ong who went the extra mile to encourage the leaders individually. We thank God for the friendships built between the Pri 5 and Pri 6 campers. We appreciate the team of in-house chefs led by Lillian Mow, and the support of young adults like Benjamin Ng in the youth ministry.

2.6 **Leadership Development and Renewal**

In 2025, the leadership team joined the combined Faith Leaders' Academy to grow on the theme: "Emotionally Healthy Spirituality." 4 new Amplify leaders were raised. 2 leaders moved up to Young Adults ministry. Four Amplify leaders went on a missions impact trip to Klang in June. We ended the year with a retreat in Johor Bahru for 15 Amplify. It is a joy to see our leaders grow up well.

Our core value: every worship member is a worshipper before a minister. This value shaped our ministry, relationships, training and discipleship.

Our weekly devotional sessions before rehearsals focused on “God is...” This has impacted our spiritual walk and the way we led worship.

We organized an “iHeart” worship session with Pastor Aaron Low. Our members experienced spiritual refreshing.

We conducted vocal, keyboard and drum trainings. These were led by internal and external trainers to help team members grow in their musical excellence and posture in worship.

We welcomed 7 new members into the worship ministry in 2025: (2) in the adults team, (1) in Amplify and (4) in the Chinese team.

FaithKids Live Worship was launched so that our children could encounter God in a personal way. We are grateful to every volunteer who sowed into the next generation!

We ended the year with a thanksgiving dinner to give thanks to God, honour our pastors and appreciate every worship team member. 2025 was a year of steady growth, strengthening foundations, and preparing hearts. Although there were changes in team structure, the ministry remained focused, spiritually grounded, and committed to serve the church faithfully across all generations.

- Carry the anointing as Levites in this church
- Lead the congregation into God’s appointed season and timing
- Grow deeper in both spiritual authority and musical excellence
- Step into the next phase of FaithKids Live Worship to raise children to serve with volunteers, cultivating a heart of worship and service from a young age

3.10 Media

In 2025, we recruited 8 volunteers to serve in the aspects of photography and translation work. We conducted a workshop on Introduction to Mobile Photography for 38 participants, including our new photography volunteers.

3.11 Missions (Local & Overseas)

Overseas Missions Committee: Rev. Lindsey Lui (Vision Caster), Pastor Aggie Chan (Executor), Colleen Yeong, Poon Bee Guan, Jenny Lim and Sherwin Calcaben.

Our Mission: To reach and transform cities of Asia with Christ’s message of hope and power.

2025 Theme: His Mandate, Our Mission. We supported and served alongside 5 overseas missions partners.

- a) Faith @ Veal, Siem Reap (since 2024). The new church celebrated her first anniversary on February 23 with Rev. Lindsey Lui, Senior Pastor of Faith Assembly and Pastor Aggie Chan, the pastor-in-charge of this church plant. About 45 children, 6 youths and 19 adults attend church regularly. BVP David Wong conducted a two-session Alpha Marriage Enrichment Course for five couples from June 30 to July 14. Two Missions Impact Teams (MIT) were sent in September and October to strengthen the church. In September, Faith@ Veal set up the Rainbow Learning Centre to connect with the children and their families.

Encountering God in Worship, Siem Reap (September 22 to 23)

We organized our first worship conference for 75 pastors and worship members from 13 churches in Siem Reap and Oudor Meanchey. The conference was led by Carol Sim (Worship

Director). We are grateful to Cambodia AG and Siem Reap Assembly of God Church for partnering with us!

- b) Cambodia Bible Institute (since Aug 2022).
We sponsored one bible school student who is pursuing his Bachelor of Arts Degree. He has started a new church and will graduate in 2026.
- c) El Shaddai Learning Centre (ESLC), Malaysia (since Jul 2019)
We supported 4 workers and gave out 4 scholarships. In December, our church gave a one-time love offering to bless the workers.
- d) Peace Evangel Myanmar Bible College, Myanmar (since Mar 2018)
We supported 2 full-time bible school students, and they will graduate in 2026.
- e) Eagles Rally, Taiwan (since Jul 2018)
In 2025, 1,839 ministers and leaders were equipped through the special services. 85 aboriginal believers were baptized in water and filled with the Holy Spirit.
- f) Yuan Lin AG, Taiwan (since Jan 2025)
We supported this young church so that more people in Yuan Lin and its vicinity will be reached (there is no AG church in this area).
- g) ACTS Bible College, Singapore
The bible college conducted her 47th Graduation Exercise at Eternal Life Assembly and 10 students graduated.
- h) Teen Challenge, Singapore
The ministry reported a fruitful year of seeing lives transformed. In 2025, 1 resident was water baptised.
- i) Inspire Community Services (since March 2022)
10 families from Whampoa and Boon Keng were empowered by the Inspire Love Cart Project. 13 students received the Bursary Merit Award. 10 residents were admitted to the S3P program. In July, we started the weekly Billy Exercise Group at Whampoa Community Club. About 35-40 participants join us every week. In July, we started Happy Station, a monthly outreach program for the community. We are encouraged to see on an average 12 new friends join us every month.

1. Celebration Service

- 1.1 In 2025, besides the 9:00 AM physical service, the Mandarin Celebration Service also had an online service at 3:00 PM. Due to decreased demand, the church ended the online service on 31 December. The sermon messages remain available on the church website after Sunday for those unable to attend the physical service. As the congregation consists mainly of elderly members, the number of members unable to attend physical services due to physical weakness and illness has increased with age. The average attendance was 123 people (online + physical).
- 1.2 In August, the speaker for the Revival Weekend was Rev. Dr. Timothy Yeung from Hong Kong. The theme for 2 August (Sat) was "Revival in the Valley", and the Sunday theme was "Living in the Holy Spirit". It reignited spiritual passion, and God brought comfort, restoration, and edification to the members' faith. After the Sunday service, we had a workshop for leaders and ministry workers. Rev. Dr. Timothy shared his passion for evangelism up close with everyone, responding to God's heart for the Great Commission. The attendance was 55 at the revival meeting and 30 for the workshop.
- 1.3 On 28 September, the Healing & Miracle outreach service speaker was Pastor Matthew Tan and his two team members. The message that day was simple yet demonstrated God's healing power, with over 26 people receiving immediate healing after prayer. There were people who accepted the Lord Jesus and rededicated their lives after witnessing the miracles. Through Pastor Matthew, God's healing anointing came upon many. We believe God's healing continued to work after the meeting, manifesting that God is a great and wonderful Healer.
- 1.4 The Worship Ministry continued to be led by Carol Sim, with the Chinese ministry core team comprising of Angeline Pang (Worship Ministry Lead) and Ang Wee Boon (Music Director / 2IC). Rev. Lorena Tsai provided spiritual guidance for the first 3 months. This year, we had 4 new team members who joined to serve in the sound, vocalist and keyboardist roles. At the same time, the number of leaders for the weekly pre-rehearsal devotionals also increased by two. The small group sharing during devotionals edified one another. There were trainings provided for the musicians, resulting in upgrading of skills. This year, three gatherings were also held to enhance team cohesion.

2. Carecells

- 2.1 Two zone leaders lead 6 groups respectively, including two elderly groups, with a total average of 33 people.
- 2.2 Community Evangelism: Various groups organized different outreach activities during Easter and Christmas periods. The two elderly groups and Inspire Community Services volunteers presented Christmas carols to 160 Whampoa residents at the Whampoa Community Club.
- 2.3 Combined Carecell Activities: The two zones each organized combined activities in May and August to build cohesion among members, and invited a total of 49 people, including 3 new friends.

4. Prayer Ministry

- 4.1 The average attendance for the monthly prayer meeting was 17 people. The average attendance for the weekly pre-service morning prayer was 7 people.
- 4.2 2025 Prayer Themes:

 - August: Day of His Power: Watching over Singapore and the Government
 - September: Cultivating Discernment and a Sense of Justice

 - November: Blessing Israel and the Middle East
 - December: Following Jesus
- 4.3 The number of attendees at prayer meetings did not increase significantly this year. Most participants were leaders. One possible factor could be that our brothers and sisters feel pressured to pray, especially praying in tongues, or it could be a lack of understanding of the Holy Spirit. We need to provide more teachings on the precious Pentecostal worship and prayer to allow more young people to be filled with the Holy Spirit, asking God to lead us back to the Holy Spirit filled church of the early church.
- 4.4 The attendance for the two Sunday fasting and prayer meetings increased significantly because the timing was convenient, and everyone stayed behind to participate after the service. We pray for God to revive the fire of prayer, igniting the congregation not just to seek convenience, but to offer a sacrifice of prayer with a grateful heart.

5. Joyful Fellowship

- 5.1 The average attendance is 40 people. Most participants are elderly members from the Chinese and English Ministries, some elderly members who do not attend carecells, as well as several new friends. This year, the Joyful Fellowship team received a vision from the pastoral team at the beginning of the year to evangelize outwards. For a start, full-time staff went to Bishan Central in March to participate in the Billy Stretchband Exercise and later shared the vision for transformation with the leaders and co-workers.
- 5.2 On 1 April, more than 10 volunteers from the Billy Stretchband Exercise team were invited to the Joyful

Fellowship to lead us in the stretching exercises. It was a refreshing experience for the members, emphasizing not only that individuals can strengthen their bodies, but also connect and build relationships with community residents.

- 5.3 On 3 June, The Joyful Fellowship organized an outing to the Mandai Boardwalk for 43 participants, including 5 new friends. This event marked the successful conclusion of this fellowship, in preparation to join the activities organized by Inspired Community Services in July, such as the stretchband exercises and "Happy Station" activities.

6. Visitation Ministry

- 6.1 Currently, the Chinese Ministry has 39 members needing visitation. Members comprising of 8 teams from the Chinese Ministry and carecell participation from the English Ministry schedule visitations to the nursing homes and private homes for Holy Communion. We are especially thankful to the team for their dedication to visit the elderly. We also wish to express our appreciation to Sister Dora from the English Ministry for her willingness to serve in the visitation ministry. Sister Dora witnessed the importance of visits through her immediate family members; i.e. both her aunt and father were once ministered to by the Chinese Ministry's visitation team. Through the seed sown, her father accepted the Lord and was baptized. This also encourages the team that although visitation is an unsung ministry, it has a far-reaching impact on others' lives.
- 6.2 During the "The Visitation Ministry of Jesus" team training on 16 November, everyone shared their insights, experiences, and difficulties faced from the year's visitations. The enthusiastic participation and mutual encouragement provided valuable spiritual teaching. I believe this team will grow and flourish with maturity. We look forward to more people joining the visitation ministry, so that more elderly members who cannot attend services can receive pastoral care.

7. Missions Ministry

- 7.1 We align with the goals of the World Assemblies of God Fellowship: with God's mandate as our mission, we continue to touch and transform the cities of Asia with the hope and power of the gospel of Christ.

- 7.2 Local Missions: Besides participating in the Love Cart voucher distribution, everyone was mobilized to become volunteers for Inspired Community Services (ICS) in August and November, to distribute ICS flyers and gifts to bless the community at Whampoa Block 78. Most residents were friendly and accepted our gifts, with only a few rejections.
- 7.3 Overseas Missions: The church continues to fund "Eagles Rally" for connection and leadership building

among indigenous peoples, as well as Yuanlin Assemblies of God Church, supporting the church's discipleship and the development of new and different ministries.

8. 2026

- 8.1 Our theme is 'Unstoppable Grace' (Matthew 10:8). Freely you have received; freely give. We believe that in the coming year, God wants us to go all out, to serve Him in grace, to experience this undeserved favour. The grace He has bestowed upon our lives is vast and sufficient for us and increasing grace upon grace. The post-Sunday service fasting and prayer will be increased to 4 times a year, to seek God's guidance for the church and for every family and individual for a greater corporate breakthrough.
- 8.2 We will continue to go into the community to connect with residents, reaching more lost people, especially the elderly, to create more opportunities for the gospel to be spread. We also see young overseas individuals, including parents on study visas for their children and working professionals, coming to church. We will actively reach out to them in anticipation of their integration into our community.
